To the Board of Trustees and the citizens of West Chester;

I am pleased to present the 2021 Operational Budget for West Chester Township. This budget focuses on the Township's core mission and services; and reflects West Chester's ongoing commitment to fiscal responsibility.

A long history of exceptional budgeting strategies and strong property values has piloted a course of financial security for West Chester Township. The challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic and the generosity of our taxpayers in approving police and fire levies in 2020 remind us of our responsibility to continue mindful and conservative spending practices, striving to exceed the expectations of our taxpayers.

The 2021 Operational Budget speaks to the priorities expressed by our residents in the 2019 National Citizen Survey and the goals outlined in the 2021-2022 Strategic Plan fueled by the ideas and experience of our Township leadership team. It continues to be a priority that we conduct outreach to ensure our work is in line with the desires of our community as we move toward an updated vision plan for the community.

Proposed operational budget expenditures for 2021 are \$48.1 million, a 5% decrease from 2020. This accounts for 10 primary funds and accounts for strategic infrastructure improvements/replacements, public safety, operational expenses and personnel costs.

The Township remains committed to preserving responsible cash carryover in order to weather challenges and extend levy life in the interest of the taxpayer.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the Board of Trustees and the citizens of West Chester for supporting extraordinary service to the community and the guidance that has led to this 2021 Operational Budget. I would also like to thank Township staff for their dedication and commitment to excellent delivery of service and sound budgeting strategy. We are all committed to serving the West Chester community and are confident that this operational budget sets the right course for a bright future.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

The Township's 2021 Operational Budget reflects a commitment to fiscal responsibility and provides the framework for how the Township plans to use its resources to serve the community.

The operational budget 2021 expenditures of \$48.1 million are within available resources maintaining carryover in each of the 10 primary funds.

West Chester's focus remains on attributes that, when collectively achieved, provide the environment for a community where people aspire to live, work and play as companies invest, innovate and succeed. These attributes include building a dynamic local economy, varied housing options, employment opportunities, diversity, wellness options, low crime and exceptional safety services, quality of life and recreational amenities, and ease of living.

As part of the 2021-2022 Strategic Plan, staff will reach out to the community in a variety of ways to understand how our stakeholders view quality of life and offer framework to the Township's future investment in amenities and infrastructure based on community interests.

The plan also places emphasis on developing a strong development strategy for the future. As the economic engine of the region, West Chester's development success has defined its position during the past two-plus decades. A clear strategy for the future will consider redevelopment opportunities and a remaining competitive.

While public safety and infrastructure (roads) are critical to West Chester's future, it is equally important that West Chester be innovative in attracting the next generation of residents and entrepreneurs motivated by the vibrancy, the experiences and the aesthetics of a community.

To create a community of the future responsive to the desires of the next generation, the feedback of our residents will be critical. By asking constituents to share their desires for the community and incorporating those priorities into a Vision Plan, West Chester can strategically pilot a course for our community's future.

OPERATIONAL BUDGET PLANNING

The Township's operational budget is a detailed illustration of projected revenues and expected expenditures by account code based on the Board of Trustees budget priorities. It does not represent individual expenditures or encumbrances.

The Board of Trustees does not formally approve the operational budget as presented. Individual expenditures greater than \$7,500 come before the Board for approval throughout the year; and there is accountability for remaining within the constraints established by the operational budget.

The Permanent Appropriations Resolution brought before the Board in February is the "official" budget document required of Townships by Ohio Revised Code. Appropriations resolutions, however, are less specific and only reflect resources available by fund.

The more stringent guidelines of the operational budget has helped map a conservative and successful financial course for the organization, maintaining cash carryover in all critical funds.

The operational budget accounts for 10 funds: General Fund, four separate Roads Funds, Cemetery Fund, West Chester Community Television Fund, Police Fund, and Fire and EMS Funds. The General Fund includes activities from Administration, Human Resources, Community Development, Community Services, Finance, Parks, Information Technology, Senior Van and General Street Lighting.

Tax Increment Finance Districts, not represented as part of the operational budget, play a critical role in large Township projects. TIF revenue is generated from commercial development in specific districts and accounts for \$8,395,000 of the Township's Capital Improvement Projects in 2021.

Across all Funds, West Chester continues to formulate more precisely and bring consistency and accountability to the largest Township expenditure – personnel. In order to meet the demands for exceptional service, personnel will always be the Township's largest expenditure, specifically in the areas of public safety and road maintenance. The Board of Trustees' investment in 2021 in addressing wage range for non-contract line employees also demonstrates the critical role of these employees in our success and enables retention and attraction of the best candidates in these positions. Investing in the Township's workforce and enhancing communication in this group is part of the 2021–2022 Strategic Plan in order to lead as a high-performing organization.

REVENUES

Revenue projections for all primary funds are approximately \$46.8 million. West Chester remains conservative in revenue projections with actual revenue receipted greater than projected in each of the past 11 years. In addition, with carryover balances in all funds, expenditures will be within available resources.

The Township benefits from a variety of revenue sources with property taxes being the primary revenue source. Property tax revenue is specifically identified for Police and Fire and EMS through voter-approved levies. Additional property tax revenue funds other work of the Township including roads and general services.

Other sources of revenue benefitting the Township include JEDD, investment interest, EMS fees, and Local Government Fund.

PROPERTY TAXES

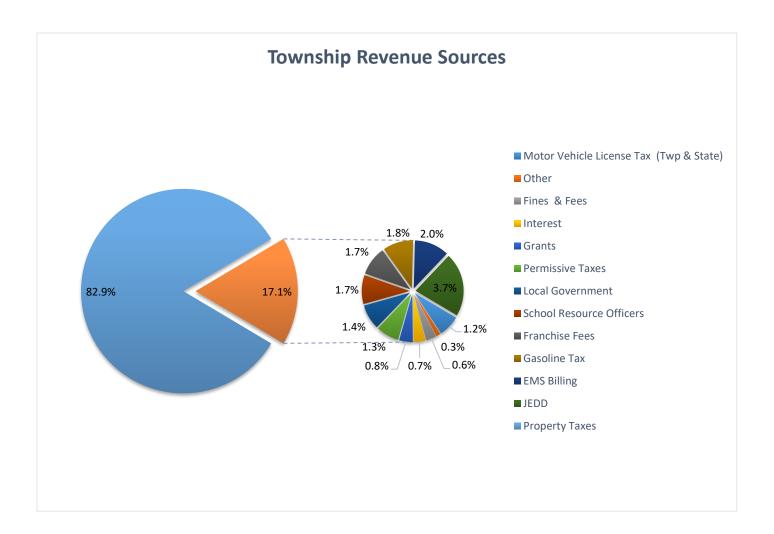
Property tax projections for 2021 represent \$37.4 million or 59.0% of the Township's revenue across all funds. Property tax collections are limited by state law, property values and by the amount approved by voters.

The approval of new levies for police and fire in 2020 allows for the continuation of existing public safety services.

The Butler County Auditor abstract, while under dispute, demonstrates a 14.5% increase in West Chester property values, based on a required re-valuation of property that occurs every six years. Last year, West Chester narrowly exceeded its 2009 previous peak assessed valuation, with \$2.4 billion now being assessed value.

OTHER REVENUE SOURCES

Part of West Chester's fiscal success is tied to its ability to utilize revenue-producing economic development and fund management tools such as JEDD, TIF and the Sustainable Infrastructure Fund (SIF) effectively and responsibly. The 2021-2022 Strategic Plan specifically addresses setting criteria for use of the SIF, started in 2009 to supplement the Roads and Bridge funds for investment in maturing critical infrastructure.



EXPENSES

GENERAL FUND

Proposed expenditures for the General Fund total \$8.07 million, 1.6% more than 2020 budget. The General Fund includes activities from Administration, Human Resources, Community Development, Community Services, Finance, Information Technology, Parks and Senior Van.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Since 2009, the General Fund has supplemented the Roads Fund in order to make critical infrastructure improvements. A direct transfer to roads demonstrated as an expense to the General Fund in each of the years since, is again proposed as \$1.5 million transfer. In addition, a portion of interest earned on investments receipted to the Sustainable Infrastructure Fund (SIF).

PARKS

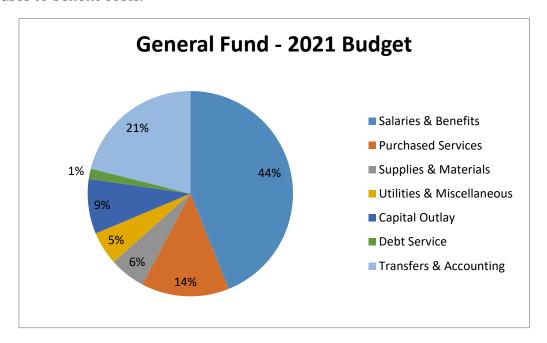
Approximately \$226,500 is budgeted for improvements to Keehner Park over the next two years.

TECHNOLOGY

Planned investments in technology include \$250,000 for document archiving and \$145,000 for updates to finance software.

PERSONNEL

In each of the categories of General Fund, the budget reflects anticipate pay increases for non-contract personnel reflective of recent compensation study, plus anticipated increases to benefit costs.



ROADS AND MAINTENANCE FUNDS

The Roads proposed budget is \$5.6 million, 14.3% less than 2020 budget. The reduced expenses are due to the one-time 2020 expense of the Tylersville Road bridge fencing.

West Chester's infrastructure and accessibility have positioned the community as the economic epicenter of the region and residents expressed these same attributes as a critical area for investment in the 2019 National Citizen Survey.

INFRASTRUCTURE

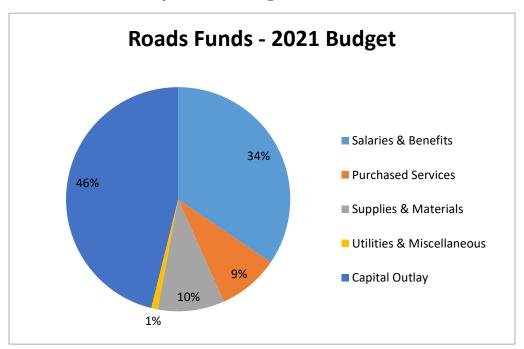
A combined allocation of \$3.3 million from Roads Funds and TIF will allow for five and a half miles of new pavement, 14,000 lineal feet of concrete curb and repair/replacement of 70 sections of storm pipe.

ROAD MAINTENANCE

The 2021 budget includes \$200,000 for the purchase of road salt.

VEHICLE REPLACEMENT

Two new salt trucks and a dump truck are budgeted for 2021 at a cost of \$380,000.



POLICE FUND

The Police Fund proposed expenditures for 2021 are \$17.148 million, a 6.2% decrease from 2020.

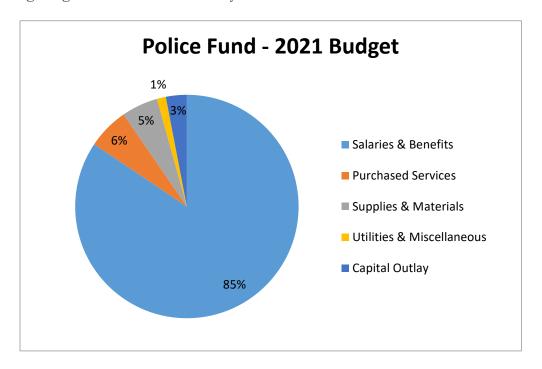
The levy approved by voters in 2020 generates an additional \$4.6 million in revenue for the department for a total of \$17.9 million in projected revenue.

PERSONNEL

Personnel costs make up the largest expenditure category in the police department, approximately 78%. The police department plans to fill seven officer vacancies and one police technician in 2021. There is also the possibility of five retire/rehire considerations which typically results in cost savings. The retire/rehire practice allows the Township to benefit from institutional knowledge of long-time employees, while realizing cost savings of hiring experienced officers at a reduced cost.

VEHICLES & EQUIPMENT

The Police Department budget includes replacement of critical equipment including high mileage vehicles, ballistic glass in Ballistic Engineered Armored Response (BEAR) vehicle, forensic lighting and a tactical camera system.



FIRE AND EMS FUNDS

The West Chester Fire Department proposes expenditures totaling \$16.12 million, 3.9% less than budgeted in 2020.

The levy approved by voters in 2020 generates an additional \$4.6 million in revenue for the department for a total of \$17.3 million in total revenue for Fire and EMS funds.

PERSONNEL

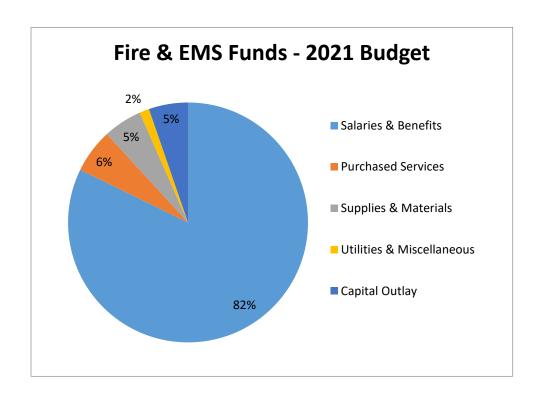
The Fire and EMS Funds personnel costs account for 82.2% of the overall proposed budget. Staffing is expected to remain consistent in 2021, but increases to payroll are planned based on contracts.

OPERATING SUPPLIES

Increases are budgeted for operating supplies in 2021 to cover anticipated equipment and supplies related to COVID response, approximately \$70,000.

TECHNOLOGY

The Fire Department is budgeting \$153,000 to replace MDTs on fire and EMS apparatus, \$40,000 for traffic signal pre-emption and \$16,000 for an upgrade to fire station alerting systems.



EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS

The 911 Emergency Communications Center budget for 2021 is \$1.81M, 7.4% more than 2020 budget. The expenses of this service are divided between the Police and Fire and EMS Funds.

CARRYOVER

Carryover has always played an important role in West Chester Township's financial success. Budgeting to need, rather than available resources, kept West Chester financially sound throughout bleak economic times and has played a vital role in extending expected lifespans of public safety levies and West Chester's enviable AAA bond rating.

Carryovers in the Township's most critical funds give confidence in times like 2020 when hotel tax collections and other revenue sources may experience decreases.

West Chester will enter 2021 with carryovers in each of its primary funds: General Fund - \$9.928 million; Roads Funds - \$2.878 million; Police Fund - \$12.890 million; Fire & EMS Funds - \$13.386 million.

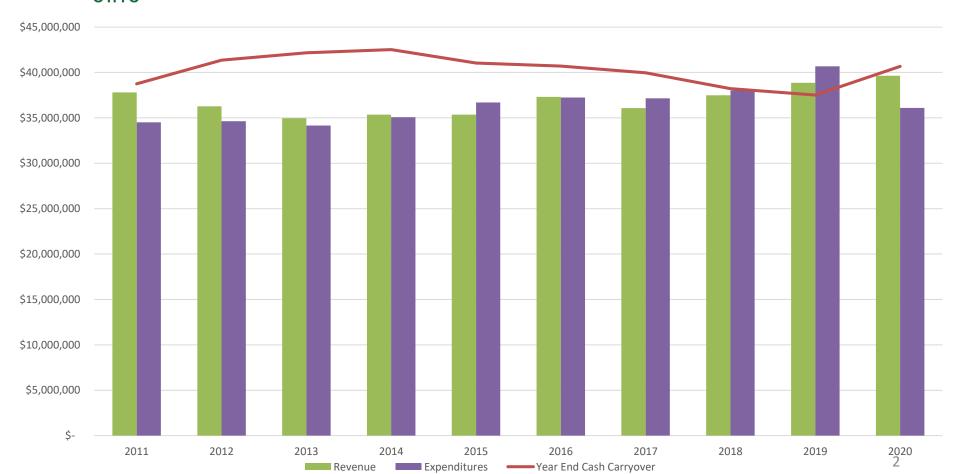

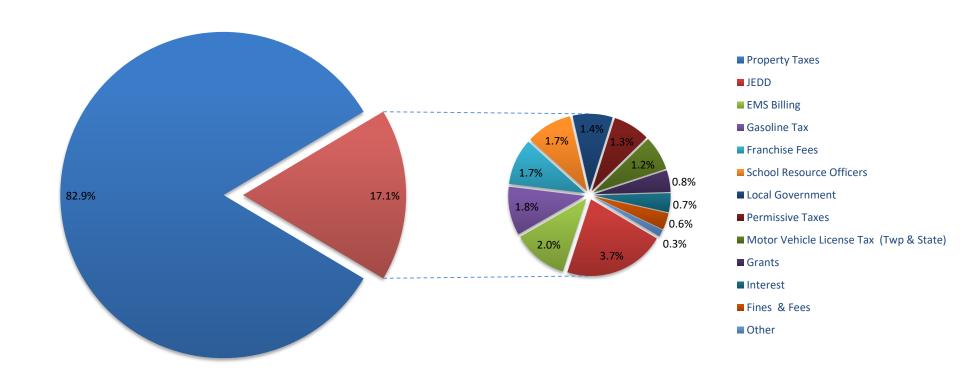


Operating Funds
Revenues, Expenditures and Year End Cash Carryover

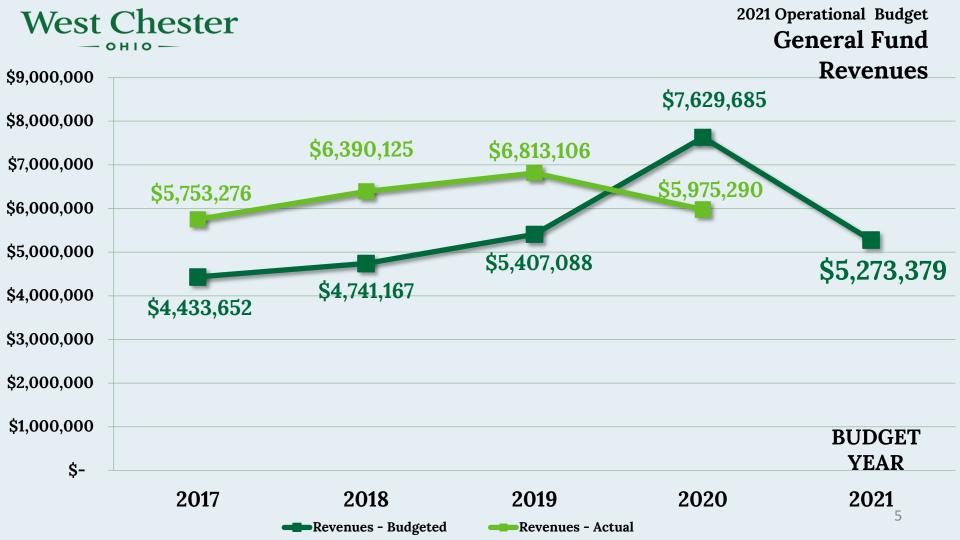


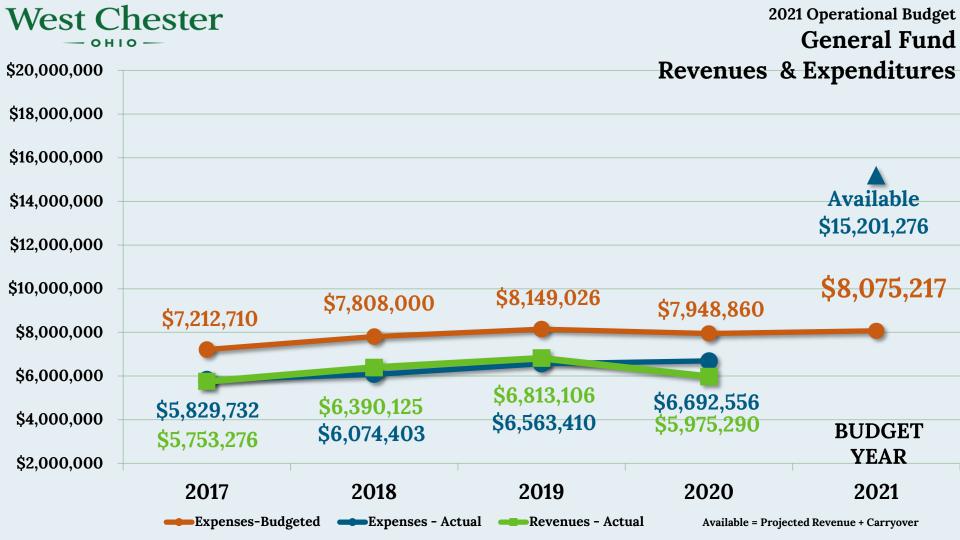


Township Revenue

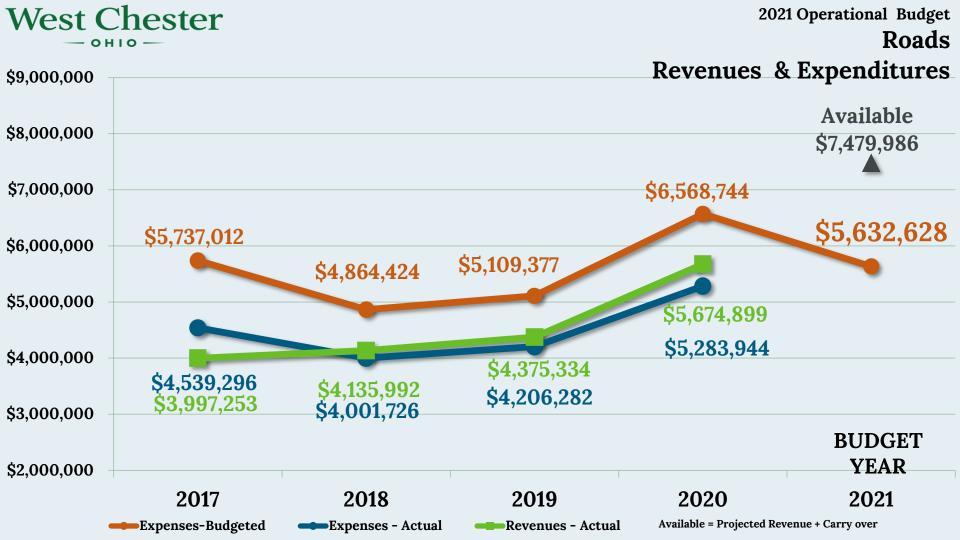

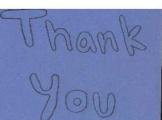
