BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Trustees of Union Township, Butler County, Ohio that:

INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is effective <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>December 21</u>, 1999, by and between the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments, herein called the "Council" and the Board of Union Township Trustees, Butler County, OH.

WHEREAS, the Council is undertaking a corridor study utilizing a Major Investment Study process relating to the I-75 Corridor from the Ohio River north to the Warren/Montgomery County line, to be funded with OKI Allocation STP funds which require a twenty percent (20%) local funding match.

WHEREAS, Union Township, Butler County, OH has determined that an analysis of future transportation needs and investments in the I-75 Corridor in the stated area is a necessary and a vital activity for the metropolitan area, including Union Township, Butler County, OH and desires to contribute to the local funding match.

IT IS NOW, THEREFORE, AGREED, that Union Township, Butler County, OH will pay to the Council the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000) dollars. It is understood that Union Township, Butler County, OH will be entitled to appoint two (2) representatives to be members of the I-75 Corridor Planning Committee which oversees the analysis and evaluation and makes recommendations regarding the study.

This Agreement contains all terms agreed upon between the parties with respect to the subject matter thereof. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both parties.

IN WITNESS THEREOF, this Agreement to have been executed by authorized officers or agents on this 21st day of December, 1999.

I-75 Corridor Transportation Study



An Essential Step In Keeping Our Region Moving

In the OKI region, I-75 is the major north-south interstate route carrying international, national and regional traffic. It was the first interstate/freeway built in the region and, to some extent, has been open to traffic since the late 1950s.

Today, I-75 is a major international corridor. With its Canadian connection (Highway 401,) it is one of the nation's busiest interstate routes for people and goods. It is the busiest trucking route on the North American continent. The Federal Highway Administration estimates truck traffic on I-75 exceeds five billion vehicle miles annually.

I-75 Affects All of Us

In addition, more than 25 communities throughout the region border I-75. We all depend on the interstate as a vital link to jobs, shopping and leisure activities. It drives economic vitality as well, creating wealth in its communities through development and commerce. For example, over \$7 million is spent each year in the corridor by motor carrier operators.

To address the primary traffic and congestion issues along the I-75 Corridor and analyze various options, including mass transit, OKI has initiated a study of I-75 from the Ohio River north to Dayton. (The Kentucky portion of I-75 is being addressed in the current I-71 Corridor study.) OKI is collaborating with the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission on this study.

OKI will use the Major Investment Study process as set forth in the federal legislation entitled Interstate Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) passed in 1991 and revised in 1998 as the Transportation Efficiency Act for the 21st Century (TEA 21.)



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I-75 Corridor Transportation Study

A Collaborative Effort

A variety of public and private entities along the corridor are stakeholders in the corridor study process. Input into transportation options and insight into community-specific issues as well as fiscal participation are needed to ensure strategic recommendations result from this study.

Private citizens, elected officials and businesses throughout the corridor are just a few of the groups that will be asked for input and insight. Early public involvement will ensure that the study's recommendations are inclusive.

As its consulting team, OKI has retained Parsons Brinkerhoff to conduct the I-75 Corridor study and Dan Pinger Public Relations to implement the public outreach program.

Major Issues to be Studied Along I-75

- Oldest interstate in the region, built in the 1950s
- Ohio River crossing
- I-75/I-74 interchange
- I-75/I-275 interchange
- I-75/S.R. 63 interchange
- I-75/S.R. 22 interchange
- I-275 connector to Route 4 serving Hamilton and Middletown
- Cincinnati Convention Center expansion over and into I-75 right of way

About OKI

The Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments (OKI) is the federally designated Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Cincinnati area. OKI serves an eight-county region including Butler, Clermont, Hamilton and Warren counties in Ohio; Boone, Campbell and Kenton counties in Kentucky; and Dearborn County in Indiana.
