RESOLUTION NO. 94-59

Concerning a Major Investment Study for the I-75 Corridor

WHEREAS: national transportation policy, as contained in the Intermodal

Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 and the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990, required that alternatives be considered before federal funding can be used for a project

that significantly expands highway capacity; and

WHEREAS: the long-range plan, Managing Mobility: Year 2010 Regional

Transportation Plan, prepared by the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments (OKI) for the eight counties making up and surrounding the greater Cincinnati metro area, contains recommendations for meeting this region's transportation needs consistent with Federal policies and

requirements; and

WHEREAS: the regional transportation plan was adopted in November,

1993; and

WHEREAS: the regional transportation plan prepared by OKI recommends

various intermodal opportunities for enhancing transportation

and air quality, including high occupancy vehicle lanes,

technological innovation and transit expansion including both

bus and light rail; and

WHEREAS: all such systems, including light rail, will mitigate congestion

and delay and improve air quality in Hamilton and Butler

Counties within the I-75 corridor and beyond; and

WHEREAS: the long range transportation plan recommends that a light

rail alignment be considered in the I-75 corridor in Hamilton and Butler Counties, as part of a regional rail transit system;

and

WHEREAS: I-75's heavy traffic volumes, which now exceed design capacity

on several segments, are expected to cause gridlock conditions

in the near future; and

WHEREAS: it may not be feasible to expand I-75's roadway capacity along

most of its length in Hamilton County because adjacent

development and physical restrictions along much of the right-

of-way would contribute to inordinate costs, estimated at

nearly \$70 million per mile, and prolong implementation time;

and

WHEREAS: the scope of I-75's transportation problems and the complexity

of potential solutions require a major transportation

improvement which in turn required the preparation of a

Major Investment Study (MIS) to consider all modes and strategies and engage the public in selecting a preferred alternative; and

WHEREAS:

a MIS should be started as soon as possible in order to expedite improvements which will alleviate current problems, accommodate future travel needs and realize expected benefits; and

WHEREAS:

the proposed MIS for the I-75 (northern) corridor would be compatible with and provide a regional perspective to the other two MIS corridor studies presently being undertaken by OKI, those being (1) the northwest corridor between Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport and Paramount King's Island Amusement Park, and (2) the eastern corridor between Cincinnati and eastern Clermont County; and

WHEREAS:

a MIS for the I-75 corridor could potentially be funded with monies available from the National Highway Safety System (NHS);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that

- 1) Union Township, Butler County, Ohio, urges OKI to initiate a MIS which will determine the best solutions to the I-75 corridor transportation problems; and
- 2) Union Township, Butler County, Ohio, urges the State of Ohio to provide NHS funds to support a MIS for the I-75 corridor through Hamilton and Butler Counties.
